Pastor's Reflections From
2017 East Ohio Annual Conference

“Bearing Fruit That Lasts”

John 15:1-17

15 “I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. ² He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. ³ You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. ⁴ Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. ⁵ I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. ⁶ Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. ⁷ If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. ⁸ My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples. ⁹ As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. ¹⁰ If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father’s commandments and abide in his love. ¹¹ I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

12 “This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. ¹³ No one has greater love than this, to lay down one’s life for one’s friends. ¹⁴ You are my friends if you do what I command you. ¹⁵ I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. ¹⁶ You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. ¹⁷ I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

Sitting in a hall 4 days straight from 8am-5pm with no air conditioning, in over 90° temperatures; stinky mayflies all around that fly in your face and cling to your hair and clothing and pop when you step on them (which you can’t avoid doing as there are so many of them!); hearing report after report after report after report, only interrupted by the occasional sermon, address, or celebration, or the ever present but dreaded “debates” on resolutions that sound and feel much more like polarized arguments than holy conferencing... THAT was the experience of Annual Conference I have come to expect. However, **not this year!** (*Praise be to God!*)

Yes, the bugs were there, the temps were excruciatingly hot, the sessions long and the customary reports were likewise (note: however the worship is ALWAYS excellent!)... but there was something VERY DIFFERENT about this year’s East Ohio Annual Conference! Something truly wonderful! So what made it so different, so great???

This 48th session of our East Ohio Conference was the first with our new Bishop Tracy Smith-Malone, and the new four-year quadrennial theme, *Bearing Fruit that Lasts: Called, Committed, and Connected*, which is based on the Scripture John 15:1-17 (see above.) As I sat through the different worship services and reports (deliberately sitting behind our district which was assigned to sit in, I think, THE ONLY HARD SEATS STILL REMAINING IN THE AUDITORIUM) I began to experience a new energy! Part of that, I am guessing, was our new focus. Our bishop asked each of the 800 or so congregations in our Conference to engage, in a new and intentional way, in the Four Areas of Focus of The United Methodist Church:

- 1) engaging in ministry with the poor;
- 2) improving global health;

- 3) developing principled Christian leaders; and
- 4) creating new and renewed congregations.

And in that same vein, many of the reports at the Annual Conference were grouped around those Four Areas of Focus. Reports on Tuesday highlighted Improving Global Health, and Creating New and Renewed Congregations, while those on Wednesday emphasized Engaging in Ministry with the Poor, and Developing Principled Christian Leaders.

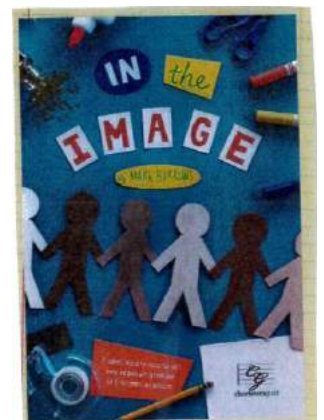
But what made this 2017 gathering of the East Ohio Conference particularly special was the underlying guidance and grace! Over and over again Bishop Malone affirmed us as delegates telling us things like “we are all one”... “we’re all in this together”... “we’ll get there”... “let’s give each other some grace”... and so on. At times in debates that in previous years have been contentious and hurtful, Bishop Malone wisely reminded us that we are one... much like what Jesus taught us reflected in the text in the Gospel of John noted above! When opposing sides of issues started to applaud for their side, Bishop Malone quickly asked us not to engage in that behavior. I suspect it is because when there are winners and losers in deeply felt issues such as these, **we all lose!** And so, with a focus on being one, on being in this work together as a conference, we were able to reflect on, discuss, AND PASS resolutions that in previous years would have been divisive and unthinkable to accomplish!

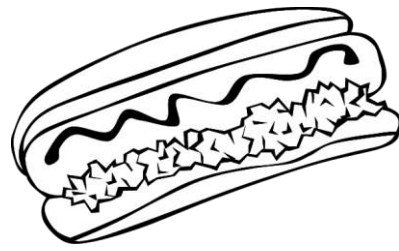
What I witnessed at our 2017 Annual Conference was the miracle of God’s Holy Spirit present in and among us **as we attempted to abide in Christ, the True Vine!** In other words, despite being in a time in this country when folks are more polarized, divided, and intolerant than at any time I’ve seen in most of my 62+ years on this earth, *we were able to function as one! To the glory of God!* And we were empowered to take a new energy back to our churches, to focus on really working together as the Body of Christ, functioning in the ways Christ has called us! It doesn’t get better than that! And if we can do that in our conference, a gathering of over 1000 souls, can we not do so in our local church as we focus on the four areas of ministry and on “bearing fruit that lasts?”

You will not be disappointed and maybe you too will be inspired again to take up the cross of Christ and go forth in the world making disciples for the transformation of our world!

July Prayer Practice: Praying in Nature

Although prayer is often thought of as an indoor activity, associated with the privacy of the home or the peace of a church sanctuary, many people experience a profound connection with God when out in the natural world. While this might not be the case when dealing with mosquitoes or poison ivy (which may themselves provoke theological speculation about purpose!), beautiful sunsets, mountain vistas, or the expanse of the night sky filled with stars frequently elicit feelings of wonder at the beauty and intricacy of creation. Even insurance companies associate nature with God, classifying the destruction of a tornado or earthquake as an “Act of God.”

The scriptures are full of imagery of nature, from the psalms, to the prophets, to the parables of Jesus. Psalm 121 asks us to lift up our eyes to the hills in order to see God. Jesus proclaims in Luke 19:40 that if the people are silent, even the stones will cry out to praise God. When God expresses his power to Job, God makes the case through his control of the mighty creatures and seas. The idea that God’s handiwork is on display throughout the universe is a belief that traces its origins to the beginning of language about God.

In the Christian tradition, St. Francis is closely associated with the concept of finding God in nature. Francis was compassionate not just to human beings, but to the animals and the other parts of nature, speaking of Brother Sun and Sister Moon, and preaching to the animals. Francis follows the tradition of the people in the Bible who likewise found a special closeness to God outside the confines of human habitation. These include Moses, who went up on the mountains to speak to God, Elijah, who was fed by the ravens, and Jesus, who frequently retreated into the wilderness to pray away from the crowds.

In the month of July, when the warmth of summer has not yet worn out its welcome, we will be exploring different ways to pray to God in nature. These practices range from going out in the nature to remind us of our connection to the rest of the created world, to close observation of a natural object to help us focus on noticing the world around us, to appreciating the earth as the source of our food and sustenance. Praying in nature can also intensify other forms of prayer, removing us from everyday human-made distractions.

Nature reminds us that we are also creations of God, connected to one another and to the world. It reminds us of the power and awesomeness of God, at both large and small scales. A life of prayer in nature can re-inspire us grow as disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world.

August Prayer Practice: Praying through Creativity

We have explored a variety of prayer practices that use words, thoughts, silence, images, and other means to communicate with God. Just about anything we do as humans can be shaped into prayer. In August we will focus on prayer through creativity and creation.

The Bible begins with the story of God’s creation of the world, culminating in the creation of human beings. Human beings are made in the image of God. Over the millennia, people have contemplated what exactly being in the image of God implies. One of the most frequent answers is that humans were given the ability to create. Praying with creativity can help us connect to God through that special gift, as well as engaging parts of our being that we might not use in more word-based prayers.

Sometimes people are intimidated by the idea of creativity, claiming that they are not artists, or musicians, or writers, or dancers. Praying with creativity does not require that one have professional level skills. Instead, it engages, perhaps reawakening, the God-given power of creation. Daniel Wolpert in *Creating a Life with God* observes that at base, most human activities involve creation: the creation of a home, a family life, a business plan, a meal. Even getting dressed in the morning is a

creation of self-image and presentation. Recognizing the pervasiveness of creativity may help to free us to explore new realms of creative connection to God.

Throughout the month we will explore different aspects of creativity as they can be shaped into a prayer practice. These include a mindful consideration of how we shape our everyday activities. How does our creation of our home, our work schedules, our family life reflect our use of God's creative power? How do our creative choices about our appearance and our households and landscapes show us to be authentic disciples of Christ? How might engaging in creative practices such as drawing, singing, dancing, or writing open new channels of communication with God? How might prayer open forgotten or suppressed forms of creativity in us?

The ability to create, order, and name things distinguishes us as creatures made in the image of God. Engaging creativity can help open us to new ways to address the issues we face in our community and the world. Praying through creativity can help us to grow as disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world.

FROM THE LIVING MEMORIAL SCHOLASHIP COMMITTEE

Application for a College Grant

All 2017 high school graduates who are church members and are advancing their education in any two or four year program are eligible (available ONE TIME ONLY) for a \$500 grant. They may send a letter to the Living Memorial Scholarship Committee, Christ United Methodist Church, 470 East Broadway Street, Alliance, OH 44601-2698 and indicate the level of participation in church (see below), the school they will be attending and the program of study. Also, all undergraduate members of the church now in college, full time, may also apply for this same grant by submitting a similar letter.

Application for a College Loan

The LIVING MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND which was established in 1960 and revised in 1986 is funded by gifts from the congregation. These funds are held by the Trustees and are granted as loans to persons wishing to further their education.

Criteria established at that time determined that the applicant be an active member of Christ United Methodist Church. Active also means participation in at least three of the following programs at Christ United Methodist Church:

Loans are now available for up to \$2,500.00 per year for you to four years, and are approved by the Living Memorial Scholarship Committee. Interest shall be charged at the rate of 1% per annum on the unpaid balance, and repayment will start six months after graduation or discontinuation of schooling. A parent or guardian shall be required to cosign any such loans, if the student is a minor. A written letter to the Committee shall contain the name and address of the applicant, the date, the amount requested, the institution where applicant has been accept, the class level of the applicant (freshmen, sophomore, etc.) and expected graduation or completion date of study.

The congregation is to be commended for their support in funding the furthering of higher education.
