The Season of Lent

Originating in the fourth century of the church, the season of **Lent** spans 40 weekdays beginning on Ash Wednesday and climaxing during Holy Week with Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday), Good Friday, and concluding Saturday before Easter. Originally, Lent was the time of preparation for those who were to be baptized, a time of concentrated study and prayer before their baptism at the Easter Vigil, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord early on Easter Sunday. But since these new members were to be received into a living community of Faith, the entire community was called to preparation. Also, this was the time when those who had been separated from the Church would prepare to rejoin the community.

Today, Lent is marked by a time of prayer and preparation to celebrate Easter. Since Sundays celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, the six Sundays that occur during Lent are not counted as part of the 40 days of Lent, and are referred to as the Sundays **in** Lent. The number 40 is connected with many biblical events, but especially with the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling. Christians today use this period of time for introspection, self-examination, and repentance. This season of the year is equal only to the Season of Advent in importance in the Christian year, and is part of the second major grouping of Christian festivals and sacred time that includes Holy Week, Easter, and Pentecost.

Lent has traditionally been marked by penitential prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Some churches today still observe a rigid schedule of fasting on certain days during Lent, especially the giving up of meat, alcohol, sweets, and other types of food. Other traditions do not place as great an emphasis on fasting, but focus on charitable deeds, especially helping those in physical need with food and clothing, or simply the giving of money to charities. Most Christian churches that observe Lent at all focus on it as a time of prayer, especially penance, repenting for failures and sin as a way to focus on the need for God's grace. It is really a preparation to celebrate God's marvelous redemption at Easter, and the resurrected life that we live, and hope for, as Christians.

Colors and Symbols of Lent

The color used in the sanctuary for most of Lent is purple, red violet, or dark violet. These colors symbolize both the pain and suffering leading up to the crucifixion of Jesus as well as the suffering of humanity and the world under sin. But purple is also the color of royalty, and so anticipates through the suffering and death of Jesus the coming resurrection and hope of newness that will be celebrated in the Resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Some churches use grey for Ash Wednesday or for the entire season of Lent, or for special days of fasting and prayer. Gray is the color of ashes, and therefore a biblical symbol of mourning and repentance. The decorations for the sanctuary during Lent should reflect this mood of penitence and reflection. Some churches avoid the use of any flowers in the sanctuary during Lent, using various dried arrangements. This can be especially effective if a flowering cross is used for Easter. Other churches use arrangements of rocks or symbols associated with the Gospel readings for the six Sundays in Lent.

Some church traditions change the sanctuary colors to red for Maundy Thursday, a symbol of the disciples and through them the community of the church. Since Holy Communion is often observed on Maundy Thursday in the context of Passover, the emphasis is on the gathered community in the presence of Jesus the Christ.

Traditionally, the sanctuary colors of Good Friday and Holy Saturday are black, the only days of the Church Year that black is used. It symbolizes the darkness brought into the world by sin. It also symbolizes death, not only the death of Jesus but the death of the whole world under the burden of sin. In this sense, it also represents the hopelessness and the endings that come as human beings try to make their own way in the world without God. Black is always replaced by white before sunrise of Easter Sunday.

Dear Friends,

Wow, can you believe we are already most of the way through the Season after Epiphany? Where did the Christmas Season go? It seemed to fly by as soon as it was time to enjoy it! (Although I have a special way of combating that seasonal rush-through. I leave my Christmas tree up until some time in February so that I can continue to enjoy the room warming lights and that wonderful aroma of pine! But then, I'm just kinda weird, I guess!)

The historic purpose of this Season after Epiphany is to help us as disciples of Christ get ready, meaning to prepare our hearts and ourselves, for the work of accompanying others on their journey to baptism or to restoration in the life of the church, which we are called to do during the upcoming Season of Lent.

Traditionally, there are two primary ways the lectionary Scripture readings for this Season after Epiphany prepare us for this task. One is by treating this as a season of "Evangelism", in which we invite newcomers to "come and see." This was our focus last year.

This year you may have noticed that we are following the other trajectory, which focuses more on the kinds of internal work we (the church) need to do to get ready. So each week our messages have been reminding us that:

- 1) **it is God speaking to us and among us,**
- 2) **that we need to listen to God's voice,**
- 3) **that we need to be ready to move when and where the Spirit says move, and**
- 4) **we need to answer God's call in the varieties of contexts we (and those we will be helping prepare throughout Lent) will experience it.**

We do this by staying focused on **a) our internal work**, and **b) on God's call — the work of discipling**, not just fellowship or friendship. Certainly we need to be able to hear clearly so that we can help those we will accompany during Lent hear God's call to go deeper, following Jesus where he leads.

But we also need to be able to hear God's call for us, Christ United Methodist Church! – our purpose, the future God wants us to fulfill as we sit on this corner of this neighborhood in Alliance! What is our purpose here in this year of 2018? What is our ministry and who are we supposed to be ministering to? What is the vision God has called us to for the short term, and then for the long term ahead? Do we know? God is surely trying to speak to us, individually and collectively in this new year, of God's plans for this congregation! Are we able to hear and understand? Are we ready to follow where God leads, even if it is into formerly uncharted territory for us? Are we willing to Rise Up (like the shepherds and like the magi and like the first disciples of Jesus) and Follow, regardless of where God is bidding us go?

All right then, let us Rise Up! For the Light is come! And the glory of the Lord is right now being revealed!

As we conclude this Season after the Epiphany let the light of God, made clearer to us through this season, prepare us to share that light with those preparing to know it for the first time during Lent, and be fully immersed into it at Easter!

Below is a prayer of confession written by the Rev. Bruce Prewer, which we prayed one Sunday during this season after Epiphany. I thought I would include it here to assist us in our efforts toward renewal.

A PRAYER OF CONFESSION

CHIMES FEBRUARY 2018 CHRISTIAN ED CORNER

This year's Annual Conference Quadrennial theme is based on the Gospel of John 15:1-17 and the theme is about 'Bearing Fruit That Lasts'. Verse 16 tells us that we have been chosen to bear fruit and the United Methodist Church has a mission statement that tells us to 'make disciples'. Our Christian Education Committee has discussed concerns about exactly what it means to evangelize, how to reach others for Christ and how to actually make disciples. How was it that we became Christians? How did we make it this far on our Christian journey?

I grew up in the African Methodist Episcopal Church at my mother's direction. During my spiritual growth and development, I do not recall receiving any particular lessons on how to evangelize. As a child I did learn what I call the 'basics': the Lord's Prayer, The 10 Commandments, Holy Communion and Baptism, etc. Come to think of it, I did not realize that there was much need to 'evangelize' because almost all of my family, friends and associates were already in the church and considered Christians.

Some people do not believe me when I tell them that I was a naturally shy little girl. I would cross to the other side of the street in order to avoid having to speak to my sister's friends. So how did it happen that I am now teaching and preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ? God only knows. Some of us have the natural 'gift of gab' and are able to talk to anybody about anything. But many of us, because of a natural shyness or feeling uncomfortable, may have a difficult time sharing the Gospel with others.

An evangelist is a person authorized to proclaim the Gospel of Christ. The early disciples were called evangelists because they shared the good news with others. All Christians today can freely bring the good news to others through teaching them and praying not only for them but with them. Over the next few months we will study personal evangelism and learn more tips on the 'how-to' so that we can improve upon what we already know and continue to bear more fruit and make more disciples.

3. Working with Rev. Bohley on self-examination.

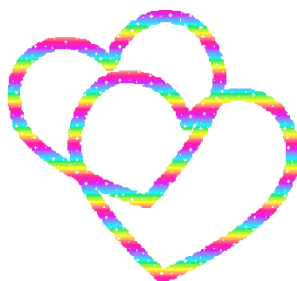
