

2023 Year in Review

Well, our annual "End of Year" reports have been completed and turned in to the East Ohio Annual Conference. So... how did we do? Overall, I am pleased and think that we did well. Of course, the numbers don't tell the whole story, but they do tell us things. So, let's review a few numbers and consider what they tell us.

We started 2023 with 289 members and we received 5 new members. Unfortunately, we removed 13 members that were lost to death. That is both sad and unfortunate and we grieve the loss of our friends. The good news is that we did gain five new members and, if we're honest, that's five more than many churches. The reality remains that our survival depends upon us inviting new people to worship, connecting them to small groups and other ministries of the church and, eventually, bringing them into membership.

Despite the loss of so many members, quite a few of whom were regular in worship, our average attendance increased from 65 to 70, which is an increase of 8 percent and our United Women in Faith saw a 25 percent increase in membership. At the same time, the average number of people who worship online increased by 50 percent from 24 to 36. We also saw an 83 percent increase in the number of children, growing from 6 to 11 in Sunday school and the addition of one more children's class to accommodate them. Not surprisingly, we did see a small decrease in adult Sunday school attendance, largely due to the loss of the older members previously mentioned. Overall, however, our average attendance in Sunday school increased by 5 percent. And, although I have said it before, as has Pastor Chris, the percentage of our congregation that attends Sunday school, compared to almost any other church in our connection, is strikingly high. In the average Protestant church, 44 percent of those in worship attend Sunday school. At Christ Church, that number is 63 percent.

We did see a 7 percent decrease in total giving and, with the departure of Men's Challenge, a small drop in building use fees, but we did see a 9 percent increase in pledged giving and an increase in "unidentified gifts" which is made up of things like our loose offering, Chuck Wagon offering, Pennies for Heaven, Sunday school offerings, and this year will include the Noisy Can offering.

Additionally, we continue to have a strong (for our size) online presence. The website where our sermons are posted currently has 221 subscribers which translates to about 70 views per week. Those same sermons are sent out to 296 subscribers by email, which is an increase of 89 from last year. Of those, about 60 subscribers open the email and read it. And our YouTube livestream increased by 17 subscribers during 2023 and now has 123 total subscribers with between 30 and 40 viewers of each week's message.

So, what does all that mean?

As I look at it, it means that there is still a need for, and an interest in what we are doing. It means that people are watching and reading online, but that some of them are also coming here in person. It means that the members and friends of Christ Church are inviting our friends and neighbors to worship with us and some of them have decided to stay and join our church family. It means that where only a few years ago it was common to have a Sunday without children, now it is rare that we do not have at least a few.

Yes, we have some challenges in front of us, but just as God has led us to navigate through those challenges in the past, we trust that he will continue to lead us into the future. Moreover, despite the losses that we have felt over the last year, the growth that we have seen gives us every reason to expect that growth to continue if we remain faithful in doing the work that God has given to us, continue being the hands and feet of Jesus, and never stop sharing what a great family that we have here at Christ Church.

In other words, there is every reason to have hope for, and even to expect a bright future.

2024 Reading List

The new 2024 Women in Faith Reading List is now available online. Here are a few of the books that are included in this year's list. They are available through interlibrary loan (ILL) from Rodman Public Library. Start out the new year by making a commitment to read more and learn more about the world around us.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT Beautiful Country: A Memoir, by Qian Julie Wang. Seven-year-old Qian arrives in New York full of curiosity—and overwhelmed by fear and scarcity. While in Chinese, the word for America translates to "beautiful country," her new life is anything but beautiful. Formerly professors, now Qian's parents labor in sweatshops and fight constantly, desperate to survive in poverty in the richest country in the world. Shunned by her classmates for her limited English, Qian turns to books—and small joys that keep her going. This New York Times bestseller reveals a family fracturing under the weight of invisibility, and a girl coming of age in the shadows, who never stops seeking the light. NURTURING FOR COMMUNITY Home Is Not a Country, by Safia Elhillo. Longlisted for the National Book Award, this poetic novel-in-verse centers on one girl, Nima, struggling with identity, loneliness, and acceptance in a culture far from her ancestral land. Caught between cultures and longing for what could be, Nima grasps for a new identity—that of a girl like her, a girl named Yasmeen, the name her parents meant to give her at birth. From acclaimed Sudanese American poet, Safia Elhillo comes this reflection on family, home, and what it truly means to belong. Suitable for youth readers. Regular print available ILL.

SOCIAL ACTION Beating Guns: Hope for People Who Are Weary of Violence, by Shaine Claiborne and Michael Martin. Bestselling author and activist Shane Claiborne and Michael Martin show why Christians should be concerned about gun violence and how they can be part of the solution. The authors transcend state rhetoric about gun control to offer a creative and productive response. Full-color images show how guns are being turned into tools and musical instruments across the nation. Charts, tables, and facts convey the realities of gun violence in America, but as the authors make clear, there is a story behind every statistic. Beating Guns allows victims and perpetrators to tell their own compelling stories, offering hope for change. Regular print available ILL.

FROM THE LIVING MEMORIAL SCHOLASHIP COMMITTEE

Application for a College Grant

All 2023-24 high school graduates who are church members and are advancing their education in any two- or four- year program are eligible (available ONE TIME ONLY) for a \$500 grant. They may send a letter to the Living Memorial Scholarship Committee, Christ United Methodist Church, 470 East Broadway Street, Alliance, OH 44601-2698 and indicate the level of participation in church (see below), the school they will be attending and the program of study. Also, all undergraduate members of the church now in college, full time, may also apply for this same grant by submitting a similar letter.

Application for a College Loan

The LIVING MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND which was established in 1960 and revised in 1986 is funded by gifts from the congregation. These funds are held by the Trustees and are granted as loans to persons wishing to further their education.

Criteria established at that time determined that the applicant be an active member of Christ United Methodist Church. Active also means participation in at least three of the following programs at Christ United Methodist Church. (During the pandemic, we know you haven't been able to participate in person. If you have participated in the prior 3-4 years, this will work.)

A. Worship Services

E. Handbell Choir

B. Church School Classes

F. Boy Scouts

C. Youth Fellowship (U.M.Y.F.)

G. Other

D. Vocal Choir

Loans are now available for up to \$3,000.00 per year for up to 4 yrs. and are approved by the Living Memorial Scholarship Committee. Interest shall be charged at the rate of 1% per annum on the unpaid balance, and repayment will start six months after graduation or discontinuation of schooling. A parent or guardian shall be required to cosign any such loans if the student is a minor. A written letter to the Committee shall contain the name and address of the applicant, the date, the amount requested, the institution where applicant has been accepted, the class level of the applicant (freshmen, sophomore, etc.) and expected graduation or completion date of study.

The congregation is to be commended for their support in funding the furthering of higher education.





The Finance Committee will be sharing options and ideas for charitable giving. This is the first in our series.


REMINDER TO IRA OWNERS AGE 70 ½ OR OVER: QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS ARE GREAT OPTIONS FOR MAKING TAX-FREE GIFTS TO THE CHURCH

The IRS reminds IRA owners aged 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ or over the option to transfer up to \$105,000 to charity tax-free each year.

These transfers, known as qualified charitable distributions or QCDs offer eligible older Americans a great way to easily give to charity each year. Moreover, for those who are at least 73, QCDs count toward the IRA owner's required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year.

Normally, distributions from a traditional IRA are taxable when received. With a QCD, however, these distributions become tax-free if they are paid directly from the IRA to an eligible charitable organization such as our church.
